#### On the Path



# March, 2025 by Rev. Bill Gupton

It's starting to feel "real" now, my friends! With just three months left in my career as a Unitarian Universalist minister, I'm beginning to engage in all the "things" that go with wrapping up a 23-year ministry at a church that has meant so very much to me and my family. Events and celebrations are being planned and scheduled. People are arranging meetings and meals for an opportunity to share thoughts and feelings, memories and blessings with me. I've already officiated at my last Christmas Eve service, my last Water Blessing service, and more; my last Easter Sunday and Flower Communion are fast approaching. I've turned over the pulpit on Stewardship Sunday

to those whose work will be part of next year's operating budget – because I won't be here.

Meetings with the committees and teams that do the work of the church have taken on a different air, as planning (which often takes the form of "looking six months ahead") also involves events and programs that I won't be part of. I've begun looking around my office, and at least *mentally* sorting my personal books and papers from those that belong to the church. This particular task – the clearing out and closing down of the "Minister's Office," and preparing to remove all that made it uniquely "mine" – is proving to be particularly emotional, for me. I actually plan to preach about this, on my next-to-last Sunday with you, on May 18, 2025.

I'm also finding it hard to lay down the now ingrained habit of planning what to preach about – again, several months in advance. I catch myself thinking about something that would "make a good reflection," only to realize that all my remaining Sundays are already scheduled, already planned, already spoken for. Perhaps that's part and parcel of why things are suddenly starting to feel "real"- I have begun walking the

path to retirement, and I can see the end of that path clearly now. It is right there, on the horizon, and growing closer with each passing day.

I promise I will share as openly and honestly as I can, with you – as I always have – what I'm thinking and feeling and experiencing, on these last steps of the journey. I hope you will do the same, with me. Together, let's "walk to the corner," as one of my own former UU ministers once described the retirement process. When he said those words to my church, way back in the 1980s, it never occurred to me that I would one day be a UU minister myself – much less that I would be walking to the corner, with my own congregation.

But, here we are. Let us make the most of this special time together!

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Loaves and Fishes - Daffodil Style



My Tribute to Connie Booth by Jaime Castle, HUUC Board of Trustees President

The following article I wrote for the Heirloom when I was serving as the HUUC Board of Trustees President back in the spring of 2019. We had just lost our church matriarch Connie Booth that February to cancer. Connie was ever-present here at Heritage and her fight was our fight — she included us in her journey with a living wake and with having us be present with her, holding our hands more than anything. I want to rerun this article now to introduce her to those who came after she left

and to remember her with those who knew her, especially her husband Bob. I have still not cut into her dress, but I think this year I am ready. We miss you, Connie!

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From an email dated April 15, 2017, at 11:32 AM:

Following up on Rev. Leslie's story a few weeks ago, and preparing for tomorrow's service, I have to say the loaves and fishes WORK! (or should it be works?)

I agreed to (Rev.) Bill's request to provide daffodils, since the service will include our congregation's very own daffodil/Easter story. Well, my daffodils tend to be on the early side of the season, and apparently so do most others' gardens.

SO, I sent out the request just the same, and what came back was.... most are gone, but you are welcome to what's there.

Also, several of you are away, but gave me permission to 'go pick' anyway. I have a very full bucket of probably a dozen or more varieties!

Five from one garden, six from another, and so it went.

And tomorrow morning while choir is rehearsing, I will be in heaven while I play with flowers from your gardens and your generous hearts.

Thanks folks!

The above passage was the last email message that I received from Connie. I tend to forage for reminders of people: voice messages, text messages, or emails from them when they pass and when I'm missing them. When my beloved aunt passed in 2012, I listened to a voicemail message from her over and over until my newer edition phone came along and it was lost. I wanted to ingrain her voice to my memory. There is so much that will keep Connie in my memory.

My first memories of Connie go way back to when she led a Sunday service that was also a singing circle. She held rehearsals on Thursdays before choir met, just for an hour, weeks ahead of that service. I couldn't join the choir at the time as my schedule with my young daughter Lucy at home made it hard. This was a perfect way for me to get out and sing. Connie was so welcoming and nurturing. We sang: "Lord prepare me, to be a sanctuary, pure and holy, tried and true" and "Doors opening, doors closing," and also one that ended with "Be here now." Showing up and being a part of this service did open doors for me at Heritage, and I felt like it was after joining in on this that I started making connections. Music was a strong connector for Connie and me. I remember the night of the Italian themed fundraising party at the Lyon house that a bunch of us were hanging out singing bluegrass and folk songs together late into the night after most guests had left. Connie was there belting along and could have kept on going, but poor Bill Lyon finally, nicely, kicked us all out. Lol!

Another thing that connected Connie and me was sewing, and she would tell me about things that she had made. She would show great interest in the projects that I took on. She would come to me if there was a fix that she couldn't quite figure out on a garment needing mending. During one of my visits to her this fall, she had her wedding dress out. She told me about how both she and her grandmother had made it. She had hand sewn on the lace appliqués and was so proud of it. It was beautiful and elegant. She asked me to take it with me. She had asked me years ago if I had wanted it. I had used wedding dresses before to convert them into flower girl, baptism, or first communion dresses. She had heard of wedding dresses being made into angel gowns – beautiful handmade burial dresses and garments as gifts to the grieving families of babies that tragically die soon after birth. I had forgotten that she had asked me about it before and this time it seemed very heavy to take it from her after hearing her story and memories of it. It is in safekeeping for now. I do not have the strength to cut into it yet.

The emails I have from her all have to do with the gardening team that she guided. I have a good-sized yard and wanted to learn more about plants so Lucy and I would help along when we could. Connie walked me all around the grounds at Heritage teaching me about the flowers and plants that she planted. The giant Azalea bush in the front by our sign when in full bloom is my favorite! She would dig up excess perennials for me and tell me to go plant them at home. I learned a lot from her and now I have herb gardens, a vegetable garden, and flower gardens. I love to garden so much, and I know that my space is only going to get better as I tend to it. I would have loved to show it to her.

Rev. Leslie's version of the loaves and fishes goes something like this: Maybe Jesus didn't miraculously create enough bread and fish for all the people that came to hear him that day. Maybe people combined their resources and took care of each other and that is why there was enough for everyone. Even the latter explanation is a miracle in its own way—humanity showing itself as innately good.

Our hearts still are hurting, and our buckets are empty right now. Like the early daffodils, Connie is gone in body. But we have our memories of her and her presence is all around us. We need to help each other out, combine our resources, and slowly fill back up our buckets. Five from one garden, six from another, and so it goes.

She is in heaven. She is playing with the flowers that she has collected from our gardens – our generous hearts.

You're Welcome, Connie! And thank you for your generous heart!

# How Do You Imagine Abundance? by Laci Lee Adams, HUUC Director of Lifespan Faith Development

When I say "abundance," what images or metaphors come to mind? If your first impulse was to try to define abundance or give a concrete example of abundance, your engagement is greatly appreciated *and* (take a deep breath, clear your mind) try to "imagine" abundance. We are in search of less concrete and

more imaginative connections to abundance.

There is a profound and growing set of academic research on the connection between our imagination and a whole host of social and personal goods. Scientists and researchers are gaining new insights into how our imaginations are essential to human thriving, to the flexibility of our brains, to our capacity for learning, and for our sense of possibility. Of note – much of this research is suggesting that *adult* imaginations lead to gains in our *adult* brains. That is to say that these emerging perspectives are starting to provide evidence for something that most sci-fi nerds and parents of "littles" have known intuitively for a while. Our capacity to imagine is incredibly powerful in helping us see beyond our current reality!

We find ourselves in times of great scarcity, not of actual resources but of human decency, of expansive thinking, of hopefulness. Scarcity breeds fear, and hording, and defensiveness, and even cruelty. I know from our conversations and our candles that we are yearning both for concrete ways to act in our world and for deeper ways of bolstering our courage, our joy, our capacity, and our possibility.

So flex your imagining muscle! The more we can imagine an expansive, and joyous, and beautiful, and diverse, and abundance world, the more we will be able to find ways and pathways to it! Share your imagining with each other, because when we flex our imagining muscles together it helps to knit us together and amplify our efforts and strength. If you are having a hard time imaging by yourself or with others, try to do it with a book (not a non-fiction book, but a book that imagines alternative possibilities for you!)

There is more hope in this world than we see. Continue to search for it or to imagine it.

### An Answer to What's Happening at Heritage — HUUC.net

Ever wanted an immediate answer to what is next Sunday's morning worship theme/speaker, or when is the Sunday potluck lunch? Ever wonder what's happening at Heritage any day this month, the next, or beyond? Ever wonder about Heritage (HUUC) or UU-ism (Unitarian Universalism) in general? Both HUUC congregants and people beyond HUUC's current community find these answers (and much more) instantly on Heritage's website - HUUC.net.

HUUC.net delivers more detailed information about HUUC events, service offerings, and issues than each Sunday morning worship service's order of service announcements, the weekly *Heritage Connection*, or the monthly *Heirloom* newsletter. This article highlights the website's areas (homepage, worship, events, and calendar) that quickly answer common questions about Heritage activities for members, friends, and the interested public.

The homepage that appears upon opening <a href="https://huuc.net">https://huuc.net</a>, and scrolling down past the "One Community, Many Paths" horizontal gray band provides answers to some of the most common questions from all readers. The homepage reveals a brief description of the next Sunday's morning worship service (including the Zoom link placed there by the Saturday before the service), information on the current week's donation recipient, and other featured upcoming events/activities. The bottom of this screen has links to other popular website items of interest - <a href="#">All Upcoming Events</a>, <a href="#">Heirloom Newsletter</a>, <a href="#">Worship Videos</a>, and <a href="#">Building and Parking Rentals</a>.

Along the top of the website is the menu bar of the website's content categories. These categories are: **About, Worship, Ministries, Community, Support, Calendar, Events, Search, Give,** and **Contact Us**. Clicking on a category activates a possible additional drop-down menu of subcategories.

A common use of HUUC.net is discovering the Sunday morning services' topics and speakers - both future and past. For future service information, open the **Worship/Worship Dates and Information** (category/subcategory) and a chronological list appears of the upcoming services and speakers for the next several weeks with a brief blurb regarding each worship service's theme. The **Kids Programming** subcategory of the **Worship** category contains the most recently posted information on the children's Sunday morning religious education sessions.

For past worship service information, **Past Worship Dates and Information** at the bottom of the **Worship Dates and Information** subcategory links the reader to a list of previous worship services' blurbs. Find edited videos of most past worship services in the **Worship/Worship Videos** subcategory.

Both congregants and the wider community use HUUC.net to obtain information on upcoming church events. Clicking on the top menu bar's *Event* category takes the reader to a long, chronological list of upcoming events. Each event shows a title, featured graphic, and a one or two sentence summary excerpt of the full article. Access the full article by clicking on the associated *Read More ...* hyperlink. The first few

events in the list are routine events occurring every week or month, such as the Healthy Lifestyles group, Midweek Mindfulness, or Sing Out Sisters.

If a specific event or meeting isn't in the events list, it may be on the church calendar. Clicking on the *Calendar* category in the top menu bar presents the current month's calendar of all church activities. Use the left/right arrow scroll buttons ( > ), found just below the Calendar title, to look beyond the current month. Clicking on an event in the calendar shows the activity's date, time/duration, location, and possibly a brief description.

These four website areas reveal just some of the information available on HUUC.net. Congregants and the wider community find useful information about Turpin High School parking, renting the building for an event or meetings, and general tidbits about HUUC and UU (such as organization, beliefs, and history) in the **About** category. The **Ministry** and **Community** categories discuss many HUUC service offerings and groups. The **Search** and **Contact Us** categories provide useful tools to answer other questions. The bottom banner to each category contains applicable data, such as directions/map, and associated links to HUUC Facebook pages/groups and the Heritage Acres Memorial Sanctuary website.

HUUC.net is continually updated. Poke around the website often to discover not only what is happening at HUUC but additional information about Heritage and the richness it offers to all.

Look Out for Phishing!



Every few weeks, someone in our congregation or on our staff receives an email that is supposedly from Rev. Bill or another member of our community, asking for "discreet" help (later explained upon your response as wanting money or gift cards sent directly to the emailer), asking for access to our directory, or asking for some other supposed favor. These may be "phishing" attacks.

Phishing is not a relaxing, recreational activity but a real hazard posed by today's digital world. Phishing is defined as the fraudulent practice of sending emails purporting to be from a reliable source to obtain personal information (such as passwords, credit card numbers, or ID numbers) or access to money. On the surface, a request from our minister or HUUC community might seem to be legitimate but unfortunately, due to these scams, such requests might not be real and are harmful scams.

Email phishing scams have used our beloved institution and leadership as fake fronts for their nefarious purposes on several occasions, even in recent weeks. A common focus of the attack is to obtain unauthorized access to our directory and other website functions. For the security of us all, do not share this information! Here are a few suggestions to avoid peril from such attacks.

- Review the return email address on emails asking for personal information or a "favor," such as sharing a password. Assure that the address is one you use to correspond with the sender.
- If the email originates from a gmail.com source, use this link to report the abuse https://support.google.com/mail/contact/abuse
 . You can also block any future emails from this email source. Other originating email servers (such as Altra Fiber accounts, e.g. fuse.net) have different procedures.
- Do not share any password information, for yourself or any HUUC function!
- Look for any unusual miss-spellings or missing typical sign-offs in emails from sources asking for information or favors.
- Do not click on or open any links or attachments in questionable emails.
- Send questionable emails immediately to spam and delete them.
- Call the supposed sender to determine if their request is real.

Help us keep our communications safe by helping us fight phishing. Thanks for your assistance.

HUUC members and friends are allowed to witness these meetings but are restrained from participating in the


discussions or the votes. On occasion, the Board will go into executive session where non-board members are not allowed to attend.






#### "Winter" Creative Corner Submissions

From the Archives

Those Who Have Served - Part 3





In the series of articles about "Those Who Served," we add this month the names of Andrew P. Henkel and the Littell family.

ANDREW P. HENKEL— Mr. Henkel was a member of our congregation through his entire adult life and contributed much to the church during that span. He was born to Hiram and Lucy (Van

Ness) Henkel in Cincinnati on January 8, 1856. He married Stella Gregory and five children were born of that relationship. One son, Paul, was an accomplished pianist studying in Europe when he was struck down by encephalitis at the young age of 24. Andrew owned a cotton textile-manufacturing firm and lived in Hyde Park with his family. He was a director of the Hyde Park Bank, a founding member of the Hyde Park Country Club and noted as an amateur astronomer who reputedly had the largest home observatory and telescope in the state. At the closing of his estate, it was valued at \$68,000.

Mr. Henkel served his church in many capacities before his untimely death from prostate cancer at the age of 51. No greater description of these contributions could be offered than the resolution passed by our Board of Trustees in January 1914. "We record our appreciation of the character and labors in behalf of our church of Mr. Andrew P. Henkel. For forty years—almost from the day he entered our city— he was a force in the life of our parish. He was ever in his pew as worshipper; as Deacon he was unremitting in his thought for the spiritual good of our Zion; as Trustee and President of the Board of Trustees, he gave of himself unreservedly to the work of all that made for the advancement of our cause in this city—his rare business acumen; his constant devotion—his services—his substance—and most valued of all the presence were ever at the call of the church's needs."



THE LITTELL FAMILY— Beginning with William J. Littell, this family remained faithful to the church in successive generations beginning in the early 1880s. Born in 1837, William Littell became a real estate and financial broker operating out of offices on West 4th Street. He first married Anna Smith but she died at age 32 in 1871. From that marriage, two children were born, Nettie and Orin. William remarried to Alnette McKimmie and four more children came from that union, but only one, Cora, lived to adulthood. William was active in the church serving on many committees and the Board of Trustees. He was part of a three-man team that laid the cornerstone for the new Essex St. Church.

William's brother Joseph was also a church member through this era. He was born in 1845 and died in 1908. Joseph and his wife Belinda Bird had but one child live to adulthood, Joseph W. Littell. Joseph passed away in 1908 but son Joseph Wesley Littell followed the family in service to our church. He held many positions of leadership and passed away in 1939.

Three of the other Littell children (Orin, Nettie, and Cora) became active members of the church as adults. Orin was married in the church to Alice Bentley and gave enormous amounts of his time to the First Society.


Between 1895 and his death in 1921, he served every year either as Secretary to the Board of Trustees or as the church business manager. He and Alice were frequently mentioned in activities within the church. Orin was a cashier for the Lincoln National Bank but also was a 33rd degree Mason, and a member of several Hyde Park business groups.

Nettie and Cora never married. Nettie was a regular participant in church services and died in 1924. Cora lived to be the last of her namesakes to grace the First Universalist Society. She was extremely active in the Clara Barton Guild and other charitable organizations within the church. She left the bulk of her estate to the church upon her death in 1961. The Heritage Room of our church is dedicated to the memory Cora of Littell and her faithful service to the Universalist religion.

Katharine comes from a line of boundary-breaking women leaders within their childhood faith tradition, finding a theological home in Unitarian Universalism in their early twenties; a lifelong call to ministry brought them to UU Religious Education nearly ten years ago. Katharine finds great joy in turning ordinary moments into extraordinary stories, some of which have been retold in dozens of congregations across the continent.
